FIRST READING Apocalypse 11:19, 12:1-6, 10

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse.
The sanctuary of God in heaven opened, and
the ark of the covenant could be seen inside it.

Now a great sign appeared in heaven; a
woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the
moon, and with the twelve stars on her head
for a crown. She was pregnant, and in labour,
crying aloud in the pangs of childbirth. Then

Luke 1:39-56

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

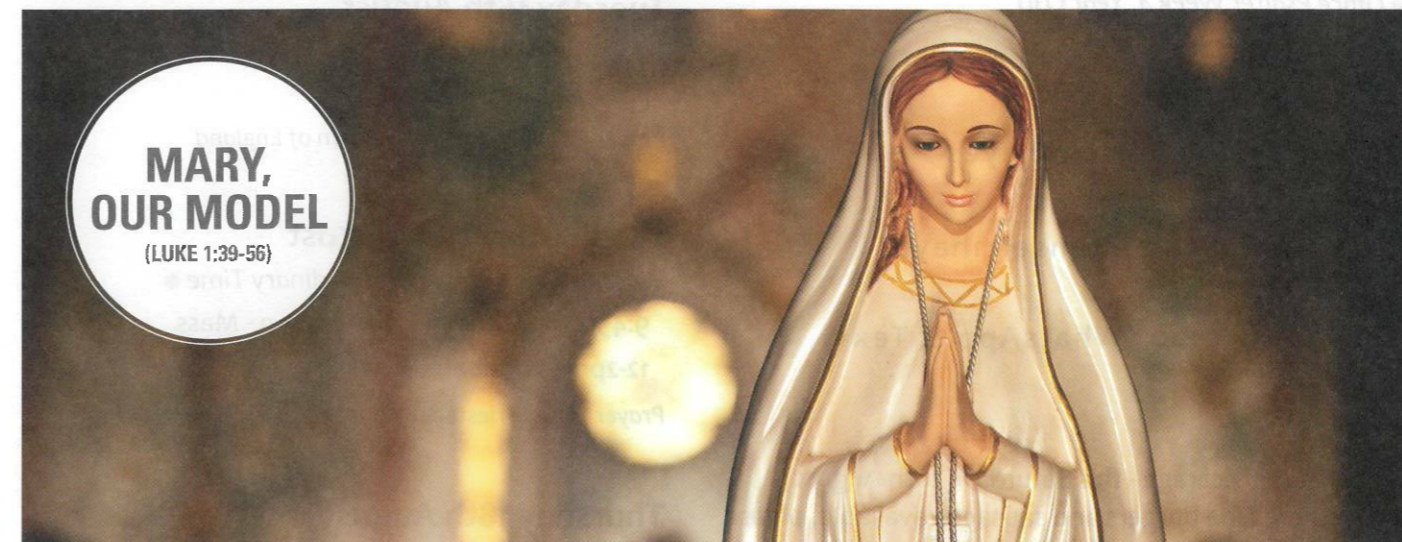
Having received the Sacrament of salvation,

THE ASSUMPTION OF THE
BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

THE WORD

Year C • Psalter Week 4



In the Hebrew scriptures, there are certain types of stories which have a definite structure. One of these patterns is known as "Birth Annunciations". This means that the child to be born is of particular significance.

Luke has two of these narratives, which concern the forthcoming arrival of John the Baptist and Jesus. The final element in such a structure is the giving of a sign. The purpose of a sign in this context is to guarantee to the person who has received the message that they were not dreaming: it is to confirm the reality of their experience. The sign given to Mary by Gabriel during her visionary encounter is that her elderly cousin Elizabeth is (unexpectedly) pregnant. So Mary's visit to Elizabeth is not an act of charity but part of a literary pattern: she goes to confirm the angel's communication.

The unborn John the Baptist makes his first announcement of the coming of the Lord by leaping for joy in his mother's womb. Elizabeth greets Mary with a beatitude for the one who "believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled." Mary responds with her song, the Magnificat. In this scene, many of the themes which run through the Gospel of Luke are stated: the importance of believing (or trusting) in the word of God; the Lord's concern with those who are on the margin of social and religious society; the reversing of human social structures.

This is the central of the five scenes in Luke's Infancy Narrative, in which the two mothers and two children are brought together. They then separate, with Mary going home and leaving the stage to Elizabeth and Zechariah. ■

REFLECT

The doctrines of our faith are not concerned only with God, Jesus and Mary, but also tell us something about ourselves. The Gospels are focused on the person of Jesus and his meaning, so the other characters in the story are seen in their relationship to Jesus, and the evangelists are not interested in them for themselves apart from Jesus. That is why there is little information about Mary: the last mention puts her in the company of the disciples in Jerusalem before Pentecost; we have no idea from the scriptures as to what happened to her after that, and none at all about the end of her life.

It seems clear that the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which we are celebrating today, reflects the ascension of Jesus in glory into the presence of God. We see in Mary someone who trusted in God's word, who accepted her part in God's plan, and whom Luke held up as the example of the true disciple, one who listens to God's word, meditates on it and puts it into practice. This, unlikely though it may seem, shows Mary's true importance as a model for the rest of us: we cannot imitate Mary in her physical motherhood of Jesus, but we can follow her example in regard to the word of God. ■

LEARN

The giving of a sign in regard to the birth of a significant person in God's plan is an integral element in the narrative.

Mary's visit to Elizabeth is to confirm the sign, and therefore the reliability, of the angel's message.

The Infancy Narratives, the first two chapters of the Gospel versions of Luke and Matthew, are primarily theological.

They set out the main themes which will run through the Gospel accounts.

DO

Notice an infant in their parent's arms or in a pram. Think of Mary and her part in bringing the Son of God into our world.
