The Parish of St Anselm, Hayes

August 17th, 2025 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In the gospel today, Jesus produces perhaps the hardest of all those sayings of his that have traditionally been called the 'hard sayings'. These are parts of Jesus's teachings that seem, at first sight at least, to be in direct contradiction to what we think of as the essence of his character and mission. Peace seems to be central to Jesus and the purpose for which the Father sent him into the world. After all, at his birth in Bethlehem, the angels announced to the shepherds that Jesus's coming brought "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." And yet here we have Jesus himself saying, "Do you think I have come to give peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." And he goes on to describe the kind of family relationships that surely no-one would ever want to endure. But the divisions that Jesus refers to here are specific and particular. He is is not sowing a general



antagonism
between people
but rather he is
honestly
pointing out that
the message he
brings will divide
those who listen
to him from
those who
choose not to.
Those who want
to bring peace

and understanding between people will always be opposed by those who would rather stoke up hatred and violence. Sadly, we see this kind of division being played out in the world right now – in Gaza and in Ukraine to name but two international examples, and nearer home where demonstrations and hostility are being directed towards asylum seekers.

A reading from the Prophet Jeremiah.

In those days: The officials said to the king, 'Let this man, Jeremiah, be put to death, for he is weakening the hands of the soldiers who are left in this city, and the hands of all the people, by speaking such words to them. For this man is not seeking the welfare of this people, but their harm.' King Zedekiah said, 'Behold, he is in your hands, for the king can do nothing against you.' So they took Jeremiah and cast him into the cistern of Malchiah, the king's son, which was in the court of the guard, letting Jeremiah down by ropes. And there was no water in the cistern, but only mud, and Jeremiah sank in the mud.

Ebed-melech went from the king's house and said to the king, 'My lord the king, these men have done evil in all that they did to Jeremiah the prophet by casting him into the cistern, and he will die there of hunger, for there is no bread left in the city.' Then the king commanded Ebed-melech the Ethiopian, 'Take thirty men with you from here, and lift Jeremiah the prophet out of the cistern before he dies.'
