FIRST READING Numbers 21:4b-9

A reading from the Book of Numbers.

In those days: The people became impatient on the way. And the people spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we loathe this worthless food.' Then the Lord sent fiery serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many people of Israel died. And the people came to Moses and said, 'We have sinned, for we have spoken against the Lord and against you. Pray to the Lord, that he take away the serpents from us.' So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, 'Make a fiery serpent and set it on a pole, and everyone who is bitten, when he sees it, shall live.' So Moses made a bronze serpent and set it on a pole. And if a serpent bit anyone, he would look at the bronze serpent and live.

And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GOSPEL John 3:13-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Amen.






The Parish of St Anselm, Hayes

September 14th, 2025 Feast of The Exaltation of the Holy Cross

In the gospel reading today, Jesus refers directly to the passage from the Book of Numbers that forms our first reading: Moses, through the power of God,



saved the people from the poisonous snakes that were attacking them as they journeyed away from their slavery in Egypt – and he did this by raising up a bronze image of a snake. Just looking

at this was enough to save someone who'd been bitten. Jesus, in his conversation with Nicodemus, draws an analogy between the saving power of the bronze serpent and the saving power of the cross on which he too would be raised up. Paul, in the second reading, contrasts the raising up of Jesus – to be raised up, or exalted, usually means to be recognised as important and powerful - with his ignominious death as a criminal, the exact opposite of being powerful or important. In the same way, the cross, originally a symbol of powerlessness and defeat, has become the central symbol of the power of the Christian faith. On this feastday we exalt the cross; in other words we recognise its power in our lives, holding it before us as the means of our salvation and protection.
