The Parish of St Anselm, Hayes

October 5th, 2025 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's gospel contains two seemingly disconnected ideas from Jesus's teaching. The first is about the power of faith. Jesus says to his disciples that if they had faith even as small as a tiny mustard seed they would be able to command a plant to uproot itself and move somewhere else. But this is Jesus using rhetoric to make a point. He is challenging the faith



of his disciples, and suggesting that their faith is so weak that it is not even the equivalent of a mustard seed. The point Jesus is making will shortly be tragically demonstrated when the

disciples all run away and forsake him in the garden of Gethsemane. Their faith in him was simply not strong enough to give them sufficient courage when the crowd and the soldiers threatened. He's not really suggesting that faith has anything to do with making plants move from one place to another! The second idea is a commentary on the harsh social relations of Jesus's time. Masters expected their slaves to do as they were told, and considered that they deserved no great thanks when they did so. Certainly, slaves would not be rewarded just for doing their jobs. We should not assume from this that Jesus approved of such oppressive relationships. But he is using them as an analogy. Just as slaves got no kudos merely for doing the things they were commanded to do, nor should we expect special treatment or praise simply for following Jesus's commandments.
